Maypole being built for Jasper

When finished, it will stand proudly and silently, reminding everyone of Jasper's connection with its German sister city, Pfaffenweiler.

But for now, it's still emerging from drawings and pieces of poplar and Jim Corn's hands.

Corn is making a Maypole that Jasper's German Club, or Deutscherverein, plans to erect somewhere downtown. He's been working on it for about two months, and wants to have it finished by the end of summer = "by Strassenfest time," he says.

A Maypole in Jasper is something German Club members have wanted for several years. The idea began snowballing recently when the sister city project got under way. Last fall, a group of local people visited Pfaffenweiler to learn more about the place most of their ancestors came from. Next month a delegation will come here. Officials from both cities have been enthusiastic about exchanging information about one another.

So it was a natural idea to have a *maibaum*, a towering symbol of springtime celebration, erected in a community that vigorously celebrates its German heritage.

Corn says for Jasper's Maypole, he's getting help from Judy Bennett, who does the drawing from which he makes his carvings, and Harold Burton, who's helping construct the pole. The German Club has given them \$1,000 for supplies; the trio is donating their services for the project.

Hanging from different levels of the 32-foot structure will be plaque-like depictions of people with several different occupations common to Jasper and Pfaffenweiler. It will show such things as a farmer, miller, stone mason, carpenter, baker and timber cutter. At the bottom, on one side, will be the black, red and yellow eagle that's the symbol of the German Club; on the other side will be three yellow wine glasses on a red background, the symbol of Pfaffenweiler. At the top will be ring of greenery. Bavarian blue and white stripes will be painted on most of the pole.

For each piece that shows an occupation, and for the ones that show the two cities' symbols, Corn takes Ms. Bennett's drawings and traces them onto slabs of poplar. Then using a band saw, he cuts out the rough outline of the front and back.

"That's about the only time a piece of machinery will be used for this," he says. Next Corn makes the traced-on drawings become three dimensional. He carefully carves out the pictures, spending an estimated 40-60 hours for each piece. Then his bas-relief product is taken to a foundry in Rockport, where it's cast in aluminum. The aluminum pieces will be painted and put on the Maypole; the wood originals also painted, probably will be used as decorations at German Club functions, according to Corn.

Woodworking is Corn's hobby, so he's happy to be chipping away and carving out the Maypole pieces on his days off from the Southern Railway in Huntingburg.

As the Maypole project has progressed, he's learned a few things he has to be careful of, though.

For instance, when he's carving out the design, he has to allow a little "clearance" space of wood on the sides so the foundry workers can pull the piece out of the sand when they're casting it. And he has to determine how deeply to carve into the wood so there's enough perspective to the image.

"We don't want these to look flat," he says. "We want people to be able to see them."

German Club members have been looking for a place to put the Maypole once it's done. Possibilities that have

been discussed include the courthouse square and the spot at Sixth and Newton behind the Kuebler building, an area that's now being used for parking.

Chamber will choose design for mural

Members of the Jasper Community Arts Commission have cast their votes for the mural design they think should be painted on the side of the Kuebler Building.

During their regular monthly meeting Tuesday, the JCAC members examined three designs by an out-of-town couple, the same artists who created the mural on the Gamble's building several years ago. The design voted for unanimously by the JCAC is done mostly in shades of yellow and orange. It depicts a farmer, some old-fashioned Jasper storefronts – including the Kuebler Building's – and the saying "Jasper, born from rich soil."

Some of the arts commissioners had some minor suggestions for refining the design, one for instance, thought the farmer's face was too Hispanic-looking and should be made to look German. Another thought some imagery of basketball ought to be included.

One of the other two designs rejected by the JCAC was similar to the one chosen, but more modern and included pictures of windsurfing, a girl on a horse, and people in German clothes dancing. The other design rejected featured butterflies.

The final decision on which to use, though, will be made by a chamber of commerce committee. It was that the chamber that in 1984 received an Indiana Arts Commission grant being used to finance most of the mural project. Although some matching funds already have been found for the grant, the chamber and JCAC still need \$2,000 in donations to pay for the project. Scaffolding for the painters is needed, too.

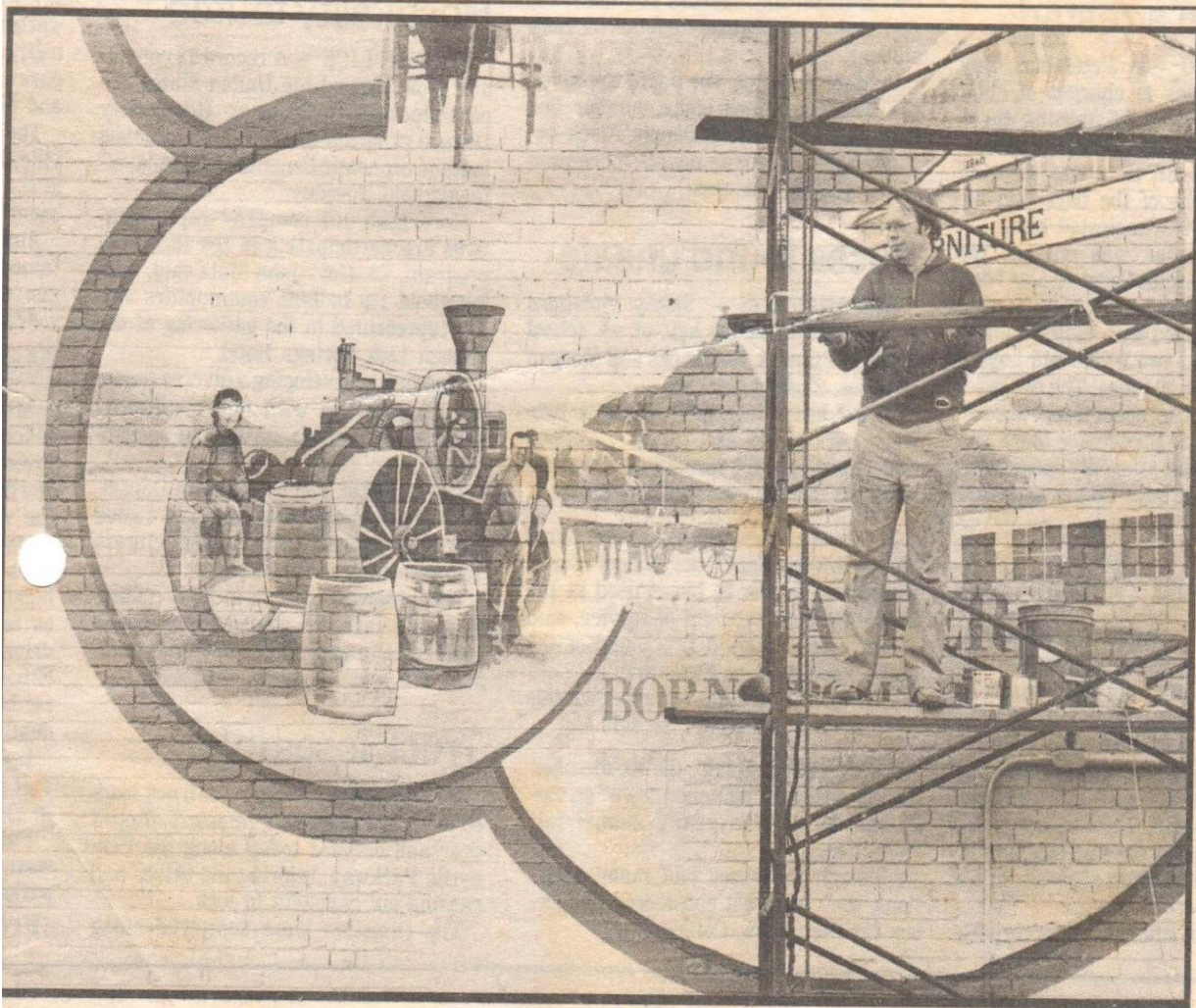
