The countdown is ON! 20 days and counting! Do you know what to pack? What kinds of shoes to take? Hair care products? So much to think about! And we still ave FINALS! Remain calm...it will all come together and before we know it-we'll be on our way!

Wednesday, May 24, 2017 5 Days!!!

We leave on our trip in 5 DAYS! It still seems so far away especially since finals are going on. I haven't started packing because I have to study for finals. I better start packing soon

Monday, May 29, 2017 Today's the day!

Courtney- May 29

Let's start this off by stating that this was my first time ever flying and it will definitely be one to remember to say the least! Today was the day I have been waiting for for over a year! After rechecking my bag an abundance of times to make sure I had everything I would be needing, I closed my suitcase one last time and loaded it into the car. My family and I began the "final voyage" to the airport and prepared to say goodbye. I gave them a hug and right when they were going to leave, I heard the screech. You know the screech... "ARE YOU KIDDING ME." Our flight was going to be delayed an hour and this caused complications with our connecting flight in Detroit. So, instead of being worried, I did the one thing I knew I had to do... I bought a bag of Goldfish (the editable kind), a Dr. Pepper, and plugged my phone into the nearest outlet. However, this was just the beginning of the #jhs+courtney Conundrum of 2017. Nearly 4 hours later and going to plan A ,B, C, D,.... and Y, we FINALLY boarded our plane... at like 10:30:). Okay, this is when I was getting nervous. Well, somehow Sam and I got stuck sitting together and neither one of us had ever flown. As was started to taxi to the run way, we held hands. Sweaty hands and all, we survived our first take

I turned on my tv set, plugged in my headphones and watched Hidden Figures while enjoying my "gourmet" food. After a while, I fell asleep and awoke to awful neck pain. FINALLY, around 12:45 German time, we landed and began our next adventure of delayed flights... but, that's story for another time. As I sit here writing this, I look out the window and smile because I know the same God that created the Earth and all of its beauty, created me.

Will - May 30

Halfway out over the Atlantic Ocean, I realized that I could no longer feel my neck. This was of course due to the fact that I was sprawled out over three plane seats in a manner most akin to the way a senile sloth flops itself over a long dead tree. Righting myself, I take a position much more favorable to my spine, and drift back to sleep.

A bit later, I am woken by a sudden stranger. This elderly Hispanic woman apparently was annoyed at her kids so she decided to move back a row. We chatted for a bit and quickly I drifted away once again. Josteling awake once more, I see her sticking a small box of airplane food in my face. "Eat. Eat your breakfast. Young men need their strength."

It was clear she was not taking no for an answer. By the time we arrived in Amsterdam, I was mostly gone. Let alone by the time we got to Berlin. We put all our luggage in our hostel rooms, and went out to see some sights on the town.

Sara - May 31

After being rudely awoken by a knock at the door this morning by someone who got up too early, I got dressed and went to breakfast with the group. We ate at a café called Karaca. I ordered Sweet Frühstuck which consisted of two croissants, fruit salad, honey, butter, cream cheese, jelly, Nutella and a hot drink (I got hot chocolate).

Then we took the U-Bahn to Checkpoint Charlie and walked around the area. We later came back and went to the Checkpoint Charlie museum. On our way to the Holocaust Memorial we stopped and got ice cream. When walking in the memorial, it was scarv to get separated from the person you were walking with. After the group I was with got approached by a woman asking for money, we left. We next visited the Brandenburg Gate. Before we want to the Haupbahnhof for food, we went to a bathroom in a Starbucks. While I was waiting someone walked in front of me and took the stall that opened (alright??). When at the Hauptbahnhof I ate currywurst and bought some souvenirs. Finally we went back to the hostel and get our bags and leave. After a two hours of driving (most of which I and everyone else slept through), we stopped at a rest stop to get a snack and use the bathroom. I paid 1 Euro to go to the bathroom and when you went through it gave you 50 Euro cents off anything you buy. I got a croissant which was way better than anything I have ever got at a gas station. Then we rode on the bus for one more hour and we arrived in Pößneck. When we arrived I was greeted by Ana, her mom, and their dog. I walked with Ana and her mom to the restaurant Ana's mom manages and got a cheeseburger. Then we walked to their house. When at the house I ate my cheeseburger with a salad Ana's mom made and watched the news. The whole time their dog and cat were playing with each other and also trying to get food. After that I took a shower and went to bed with the cat running around in my room.

June 1, 2017

First off I'd like to say that it is 10 days until my 18th birthday. Today was our first day of school. Which is very different from American school. So to start the day off I woke up at 6 and ate breakfast which was bread with Nutella and apples slices with a glass of orange juice. Then around 6:45 we left the house for the bus stop to catch a bus to school. When we got there all of the American students gathered in the Auditorium and were greeted by the headmaster of the school. After that Herr Schirrmeister took us on a grand tour of the school. The school is really nice, it's small but nice. It was built in 1888 and then rebuilt after the war. The cool thing about the school is that instead of many halls it has floors. So it'd be like taking Jasper High School and separating each hall and stacking them on top of each other. That makes it really easy to navigate, at one point Will and I walked out of class to go find the restroom. We walked up to the next floor and found the restroom then walked back without a problem. I can't even leave class in Jasper to go to the restroom without struggling to find one, and I've been there for three years! After the tour we waited in the cafeteria for our Germans to come get us. So after that we had our first class which for me us Geschichte (history). In Gesichte we learned about der Kalter Krieg (Cold War). We watched a video on the hottest moments of the Cold War. Which I could

understand some of. After that we had a pause or break and we all hung out in the cafeteria again. After the break was Chem. In this class some students gave presentations about different things. One was about detergent and another was about Coca-Cola. That was interesting to see the students give presentations in German. After Chem was over we went back to Gesichte for a block period. This was really just another break for the first period. Today was actually Kindertag or Kids Day in here so at the end of the first period of The second Geschichte class the teacher took us all out for Eis (ice cream). It was so weird just leaving the school in the middle of the day like that. We got a good look at Pößneck during that time and it was beautiful. There are so many colors and old buildings. So after Geschichte Teresa and the others had a test so Grant, Drake, Kate, Will and I went to the cafeteria for the first half of their Geography class. After that class it was about 1:00 and Teresa was done for the day so we went and rode the bus home. When her mom got home she made us all bowls of Eis and we sat outside and talked about things to do. After that we rode to Emmi's house to get ready for the welcome party. Teresa and Emmi gave Drake and I a short tour of Pößneck before we headed to the party. The party itself was fun. The food was really delicious and I had fun talking to everyone. After the party Teresa and I went back to Emmi's and played some games. When we went back home we took showers and played rummy with her family. So far this trip has turned out to be a good one. -Nick Hedinger

June 2

The morning started with the sound of my alarm going off. I turned it off, got ready, and went to downstairs to eat breakfast. I had some cereal and toast which started off my day good. When we arrived at school, we had the first two periods to hang out and relax while our host students were in class. After that, we got a tour of the city which was fantastic. June 3rd. 2017

Family day. I woke up later than normal because we didn't have to go to school today. We ate breakfast

which was yogurt with fruit and cereal, pretty healthy compared to my regular breakfast in America. This morning we left home around 11 to go tour Jena (45 minutes drive). My host family told me that Jena was a city full of universities and many students, with a population close to 500 thousand people. Whenever we got there, we started walking around the city and then we headed towards the Jen Tower, which is the tallest building in the city. On our way there, we walked by the mall and I found interesting that there wasn't a parking lot close to the mall. In the entrance you could see a bunch of people coming in their bikes, leaving them outside and then coming back with the stuff they had bought. They would tie them in the back of their bikes and then they would leave to where they needed to be. It is way different to what we are used to in Jasper, since in America nobody goes to a mall in a bicycle. That made me notice that everyone uses a bike to go wherever they want, as it seems it is more useful and cheaper than a car. We got to the tower which had 30 floors, we saw the entire city from up there and I also noticed almost all the roofs were red, pretty common in Germany was what my host mother told me! After we were done seeing the city we headed to a marketplace and ate lunch. After that we kept walking and it was cool that we bump into Frau Arthur, Judge, Samantha, Nomi and Nomi's mother. We stopped for a second to chat and then kept walking our way. We went to a museum in a university which was pretty empty considering that today is saturday (I believe, I and my host family were the only ones there), after we were done in the museum we went to the planetarium and watched a function in it about the universe, it was in Germany of course, so I didn't understand all of it. After that, it started raining so we headed home and then hanged out with some friends! It was a nice to meet new people and learn more about the German culture.

Sunday June 4 Sunday-Family Day.

My host mom drove us out to her father's lake house on the Saal. We started with coffee and cake then took a hike to the top of an area of the mountain that overlooked the cove. On the drive back we could see the whole valley and I took pictures of a castle in the distance. Then we stopped at one of the dams to walk around. This area has three dams that use the water to produce all the electricity for the area.

When we got back, several of us Amis and Germans hung out until about midnight. There are a few of us living here on the same street.

Amis is their nickname for us. When they were in America, we always needed to know where our Germans were, and here, they always need to know where their Amis are.

Tomorrow is another family day and we get to see my mom's brother Oliver.

8 Juni

Today we were given the experience of touring the beautiful art-centric city of Weimar and the neighboring window into a hateful and dreaded past of the Buchenwald concentration camp. Weimar is a very important place where the great literary minds of Schiller and Göthe (photo) lived and worked (the Shakespeares of Germany). Johann Sebastian Bach also lived and worked in Weimar, crafting his many musical masterpieces that would be heard for centuries to come. This center for art and literature is contrasted by the nearby plot of land called Buchenwald, a Nazi concentration camp, where prisoners were forced to work in brutal conditions for no reason other than their personal philosophies. 56,000 people lost their lives in Buchenwald to either the unrestricted violence inside the camp, or purely from the intense work and awful conditions of the camp. I only had time to respectfully walk through the crematorium and even the "strangulation room" under it where 1,100 people died from being hung from hooks on the walls. It was a crazy experience to be in the same place that we've learned about in the history books. I was mainly disappointed that we only had about an hour and a half to soak everything in. I really felt like I could stay there the whole day and still not appreciate the struggles that the prisoners went through, and the atrocities that the Nazis committed.

This first 9 days in Germany since last summer is like arriving in a place that is completely foreign, but makes me feel totally at home. I'm excited for the weeks to come and the experiences yet to be had. Tyler

Sunday, June 11, 2017 Courtney on Buchenwald

We walked up to the old concrete and iron gates of Buchenwald. I looked around and felt a wave of sadness and a cold shiver run down my spine. The entry to the camp read, "jedem das seine", meaning to each their own. When I entered the camp, it was instantly cold. A cool breeze was blowing constantly, a reminder of the horror that had happened here.

I felt alone in this desolate place, where 57,000 innocent people were murdered. I started out by walking around the barracks. All I could think about was how many people starved and died of disease right next to their friends. I separated myself from the group. I stayed back and let the others walk ahead.

I slowly approached the crematory. A signed warned me before entering that I should remain silent in order to show respect for those who were cremated or never given a proper burial in this awful place. In the first room, there was an "operation table." This table was used to torture and punish some of the prisoners of Buchenwald. A glass case was lined with surgical tools. Imagine having an operation without any anesthesia, or being able to see the operation happen and screaming out for help, but no one coming to help you.

The second room was full of plaques with names of some of the people who died there written on them. I stood in the center of the room for 10 minutes and read all of the names lining the wall. To my right, I saw hundreds of urns that were used to hold the bodies of innocent people stuck in a time of evil. It was all too much. I began to tear up. The energy in this place was all

I walked into the next room where the actual "ovens" were. The cold concrete slabs, the harsh iron doors, being lit up by an engulfing flame. Just as I thought it couldn't get any worse, it did. I went into the basement and saw a chute where the Nazis threw those imprisoned down, dead or alive. If you were dead, you would be sent directly up an elevator and burned. If alive, you would either be strangled or shot and then set up the elevator. I began to feel dizzy and lightheaded, so I sat down for a while and thought about it all. This awful place gave me chills to the bone. I could almost feel the thousands killed here begging for a chance to tell the story. I could almost feel their weariness and pain. I got up and left the crematorium and went to the medical examination

Here, many Jews were stripped, searched, weighed, labelled with a uniform, and then measured for height. Behind the height measuring tool, was s small door big enough for a gun to be slid into from the next room behind this one. When being measured, a Nazi would

slide his gun into this hole, and the Jewish person being measured would be killed instantly. They would never see it coming

While in Buchenwald, it opened my eyes to what actually went on in these awful places. It pained me to know that Buchenwald was not the worst of them all. Also, it was depressing to know that I only learned what happened "on stage" and not behind scenes. This was definitely an experience that I will never forget. My eyes have been opened to the pain of World War II.

June 11- Drake

Today me and Grant Keller saw a palace called Schloss Heidecksburg. It was very interesting because they kept a large portion of the palace as it was in the 18th century. The palace was very large and was located at the very top of a mountain looking down at the surrounding city. It was very enjoyable to hear about the history of the palace and its purpose throughout history. After we visited the palace we ate some ice cream at a nearby cafe then went to a public pool to hang out and swim for Nick's birthday. I was very surprised to see so many people swimming in the pool even though it was 75 degrees which does not seem so bad until you actually get in the water. After swimming Grant, Emilia and I went back home where we had grilled rabbit with Thüringiandumplings. It tasted wonderful considering I had never had grilled rabbit before. Parmesan Crisps

Parmesan Crisps Recipe

These flourless cheese crisps have only two ingredients (Parmesan cheese and black pepper) and are great for serving as an appetizer or on top of a soup or salad.

Ingredients

- 2 ounces grated fresh Parmesan cheese (about 1/2 cup)
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

How to Make It

Step 1

Preheat oven to 400°.

Step 2

Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper. Spoon cheese by tablespoonfuls 2 inches apart on prepared baking sheet. Spread each mound to a 2-inch diameter. Sprinkle mounds with pepper. Bake at 400° for 6 to 8 minutes or until crisp and golden. Cool completely on baking sheet. Remove from baking sheet using a thin spatula.
