Matthias Hilger Named the 2017 Hoosier German-American of the Year

Matthias Hilger was named the IGHS Hoosier German-American for 2017. The presentation was made by Mr. Heinz Roesch, president of the Indiana German Heritage Society, at the GermanFest in Indianapolis on Saturday, October 14, 2017.

This honor is in recognition of his ongoing efforts to promote German-American culture in the state and for forging strong ties, and an enduring friendship between the people of Pfaffenweiler and Jasper.

Matthias Hilger was born in Pfaffenweiler and originally came to Jasper in 1987 through Sister Cities of Jasper, Inc. as its first practical youth trainee. Stan Krempp gave him a job as a cabinet maker journeyman at the former Indiana Desk Company and Claude and Martina Eckert provided him with a place to live.

Matthias is married to Kathy Young and they are the parents of two adult children, Amanda and Alex.

He has been active in the Jasper DeutscherVerein and Sister Cities of Jasper, Inc. Having been a member of both board of directors. He was the first president of the Jasper Partnership Commission.

Matthias Hilger becomes the eleventh Hoosier to earn the title of IGHS Hoosier German-American of the Year.

She is currently going to the Faust Gymnasium Staufen, which is the exchange school for our Jasper High School. As she does not want to lose a complete school year going through the Homestay Program through Sister Cities International, she has talked to her teachers and can break free from her normal school schedule, next year 2018 starting May 15th, 2018 until September 7th, 2018.

As we don't want to go through the complete visa process of getting a work permit the complete sat cannot be longer than 3 months, as she then can visit with a normal Visitor Visa.

That however will also prevent her from potentially earning any income on whatever job(s) we can find her. As her plans are to go into the medical field, the HOSA program through the High School might make sense for her.

She is currently filling out a basic application form, the one we use for our Homestay program, in which she needs to introduce herself, present her family, her hobbies etc.

Sarah is already in her professional life. She uses English and Italian as a customer service support every day, but she also has French and Spanish language skills.

Currently she is for the company Wagner System GmbH in Lahr :

www.wagner-system.de/en. Her official job title is "Customer Relations Manager".

She is responsible for the woodworking customers of Wagner-system. Her tasks for example are to search for product solutions for customers (glides and casters for chairs, tables, sofa; sometimes even customized articles); Quoting products, sales analysis for their customers at the end of the year, preparing for exhibits etc.

She has gone several times to Italy to visit some of their customers personally and she also presented their products at large exhibits.

After graduating from the German High School called Gymnasium with the Abitur, she attended the language school in Baden-Baden where she was trained as a foreign language correspondent (English and Spanish as Business Language, Italian and French as colloquial language). Beer Cheese Dip with Bacon

Serves 15 Prep Time: 10 minutes Total Time: 2 hours

Ingredients

8 ounces cream cheese
1 pound sharp cheddar cheese, small dice
½ pound Colby-Jack cheese, small dice
10 ounces bacon, cooked and chopped (reserve some for garnish)
½ teaspoon dry ground mustard
8 ounces Amber Ale beer
1 tablespoon hot sauce (choose your favorite)
½ cup cherry tomatoes, small dice, for garnish (optional)
½ cup chopped fresh parsley, for garnish (optional)

Directions

Into the bowl of a 3-quart slow cooker, add the cream cheese, sharp cheddar cheese, Colby-Jack cheese, bacon, dry ground mustard, beer, and hot sauce.

Heat on high for 1-1/2 to 2 hours, stirring occasionally, until melted and smooth.

When dip has finished cooking, turn the heat to warm and garnish with the reserved bacon, cherry tomatoes, and parsley.
