Advent Calendars that count the days until Christmas

In Germany, the days are filled with sweet chocolate

Luckliy for this chocolate lover, that is the same tradition in Jasper

Advent wreaths that count the weeks until Christmas

In Germany, these wreaths are on the kitchen table or fireplace mantel. The additional candles are lit as the days become shorter and more light is needed in the evening.

In Jasper the Churches bless the Advent wreath and light the candles each week.

Shopping for Christmas gifts

In Germany *Weihnachtsmärktem* has local artisans selling their goods. Jasper's Downtown is alive with Christmas spirit during OTannenbaum Day

Christmas Tree Oh Tannenbaum has been decorated in Germany for over 400 years. Children do not see the tree until Christmas Eve when it is lit for the first time.

In Jasper homes, the Christmas Tree is a focal point of family Christmas festivities So what would we call Tree Hopping without a Christmas Tree? St. Nicholas leaving goodies for good girls and boys In Germany, the goodies are left in shoes or boots. In Jasper, the goodies are left in stockings. For some families this is where the children place their letter to Santa.

Many of the German traditions listed are celebrated in many United States communities. The exception is the celebration of the feast of St. Nicholas. That seems to be communities with large populations of German ancestry.

Thanks for everyone in the German Club who makes the club fun and helps to preserve the German heritage for generations yet to come.

Jasper Deutscher Verein Taking Scholarship Applications

The Jasper Deutscher Verein is offering a scholarship in the amount of \$1,000 to a German student of Dubois County. If you have a child, grandchild or know of anyone who would like to submit an application, please inform them to contact their Guidance Counselor at their school. Applications must be postmarked no later than April 1, 2018. If any questions, please contact Linda Wehr at 812-482-4432.

At their January Board of Directors' Meeting in 2008, the following adopted the following qualifications for the Dubois County Scholarship in the amount of \$1,000.00.

1. Completion of the common scholarship application available from the School's Guidance Office.

2. Successful completion of two years of high school German.

3. Two years of active participation in German Club or German Civic affairs in other schools.

4. Verification of enrollment in a German course at the college of their choice, or participation in an accredited German study abroad program such as the IU Honors Program.

5. Submission of a one page or less essay stating your personal qualifications and intentions.

6. GPA consideration.

7. Participation in an exchange program or hosting an exchange student.

8. Submission of two letters of recommendation from adults <u>other than</u> school personnel regarding personal character, etc.

9. The scholarship will be awarded upon verification of enrollment in German at college or acceptance into another German study abroad program such as the IU Honors Program. A \$500.00 scholarship will be given for the first semester and will be renewable for the second semester.

10. Parental membership in the Jasper Deutscher Verein will be considered.

When Do You Take Down the Christmas Tree?

I walk almost every day ... for fitness, for air, to get out of the house... so I get a daily view of what's going on in the neighborhood. Between Thanksgiving and Christmas, I saw Christmas decorations go up. Decorated trees filled windows...

But then Christmas ended.

The VERY next day, discarded trees started lining the sidewalks. In fact, I think some were already out before Christmas Day ended.

And that made me wonder....

When do you take down your Christmas Tree?

There was a hard and fast rule in our German home. The Christmas Tree stays up until after January 6, the 12th day of Christmas, Epiphany. For any of you who forgot your Sunday School lessons, the Epiphany is the day when the Three Kings or Wise Men arrived at the stable in Bethlehem to bring gifts to the Christ Child. In fact, in the Eastern Orthodox Church, children receive gifts on THIS day... not the 24th or 25th. In some Catholic areas of Germany, the tree is even left up until Feb 2, Candlemas!

In fact, it's considered UNLUCKY to take the tree down early. (And I really need all the luck I can get). So... the tree comes down on the 7th.

when do you take down your Christmas Tree(Of course.. this messes me up with the community "Tree Collection" programs... they all want my tree earlier. And there was an unfortunate incident where I got into an argument with a boy scout leader who couldn't understand why I wouldn't budge...)

January 7th is the end of Weinachten for me... and the day I am finally ready to let Christmas go back into the storage boxes. Ornaments are wrapped and placed carefully into boxes, lights are wrapped around a spool so they can be used again next year, and the tree top Angel (who we keep swearing we will replace) gets packed away.

And then, only then ... I can add my tree to the trees on the sidewalk.

ps. I guess it helps that in our home, we set up the Christmas Tree much later than our neighbors. This year, I was perfectly happy to set it up the weekend before Christmas. So the tree is still fresh, and not dropping needles yet. (The youngest child is in charge of keeping it watered).



Groundhog Day, A German Tradition?

Groundhog Day, a GERMAN Tradition? Turns out that weather prediction using a burrowing animal on the 2nd of February has it's roots in Germany. The German immigrants who landed in America, and brought their tradition with them. Of course... a few adjustments had to be made... in America, there are no Hedgehogs (Igel), so a Groundhog was substituted. (And Bill Murray didn't play into it....)

"Wenn der Igel Lichtmess seinen Schatten sieht,

so Kriecht er wieder auf sechs Wochen ins Loch."

"If the hedgehog sees his shadow at Candlemas, He will crawl back into his hole for another six weeks."

In the Catholic Church, February 2nd it is the celebration of Candlemas, the day that Mary presented her son, Jesus in the Temple. It is a time of light in winter, it sometimes coincides with the beginning of Lent. And for everyone who is tired of the cold and snow, it is a time to wonder how much longer winter will last. No wonder people started to look for ways to predict the coming of spring!

Groundhog Day A German Tradition? What do you do when you can't find a Hedgehog?

Groundhog Day a German tradition. In the 1840's German farmers settled in Pennsylvania, USA. They brought German Traditions with them, including, weather prediction. Every February 2nd, Maria Lichtmess, they would consult with a Hedgehog, or Igel, to see whether winter would drag on, or end soon.

Problem is, there is a serious shortage of Hedgehogs in Pennsylvania.

They substituted a Woodchuck.. aka. a Groundhog... and a new tradition was born.
