Stan Jochum, Alan Hanselman, and Matthias Hilger, members of the Sister Cities of Jasper Board of Directors were instrumental in working with the Weinhaus in Pfaffenweiler to get wine made in Pfaffenweiler imported to the area. The Weinhaus is a co-op winery where land owners who raise grapes take their harvested grapes to be made into wine.

City of Jasper awarded for business, trade

JASPER — The City of Jasper has won the Sister Cities International 2019 Innovation Award for Business and Trade for a city with a population less than 25,000. The awards competition, which is open to over 500 sister city programs nationwide, recognizes the accomplishments of outstanding individuals and community sister city programs that are promoting peace through mutual respect, understanding and cooperation. The idea of importing wine from Pfaffenweiler, Germany, to Jasper was generated during a discussion held at a joint Sisters Cities & Partnership meeting marking their 30th anniversary as Sister Cities in 2015.

The ensuing work resulted in an exclusive trade relationship in the U.S. At this time, the only place to purchase, taste and drink Pfaffenweiler wine in the U.S. is in Jasper. The goal was to develop an economic activity that would benefit and continue to promote the connection between Sister Cities of Jasper and the Sister City of Pfaffenweiler.

An initial order of 125 cases was secured after research, planning and organization. The order was placed with the Pfaffenweiler winery in November 2018. The shipment arrived in Jasper in March. Preparation for improved labeling of the wine bottles and a more economical means of shipping the product has already begun. It is hoped that continued communication between all of the players will provide greater opportunity for success and sustainability in the future.

Sister Cities International Annual Awards recognize excellence in overall programming and highlight key innovations in arts and culture; business and trade; humanitarian assistance; youth and education; and professional and technical exchange categories. The organization also honors a Volunteer of the Year and Youth Leadership who demonstrate exceptional efforts to advance peace through citizen diplomacy.

This year's award winners will be honored during SCI's 2019 Annual Conference later this month in Houston.

JASPER — Sister Cities International, founded by Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1956, recently held its annual convention in Houston. Many foreign ambassadors were present to promote the organization, which builds global cooperation by promoting cultural understanding and economic development.

Alan Hanselman, co-owner of The Schnitzelbank, was present to accept the Business Trade Award on behalf of Sister Cities of Jasper.

Jasper Sister Cities committee members and Hanselman were instrumental in acquiring the Pfaffenweiler wines that were imported to Jasper, currently the only U.S. city to carry the wine.

The following is the German Exchange Travel Blog – Gruppe 17 – 2019 kept by the students as they traveled in Germany!!!!!!

May 26 - Lane

I've been on the plane for about a half an hour. We're above the clouds and it is absolutely stunning. The light blues and vibrant greys if the sky are quite appealing. Unfortunately the trip to get on the plane was not such a nice picture. It was a lot of lines and questions. People got pulled over for having food or other things. One of the students had to have a pat down! It's ironic to me because she actually looks like she wouldn't even cuss. But one knows how it is at the TSA.

Left Chicago about 3 hours ago and have been bored but very excited. The promised internet does not work, nor does the television in the seat. But I suppose it gives me a chance to look at the clouds. We got a choice of beef or nuddles [noodles with jetlag] for supper. Was not the worst thing in the world. I think we just now arrived at the ocean. I would look and see if I could actually see the ocean, but it's masked in the clouds and the darkness from the evening. There is a lot of turbulence at this point as well. I hope nothing goes wrong in the next 5 hours!

Those 5 hours went about as well as expected. It was cramped, babies were crying, etcetera...

The airline fed us breakfast. It was a muffin and a fruit cup. Was not very good. But I didn't come to Germany for the airline experience! Overall I'm very excited to finally be in Germany.

May 27 – Grant

I have lost my mortal grasp of time; I have experienced dawn, dusk and midnight within the span of 4 hours. As of writing this, I have come to realize the past 14 hours of my life we're spent traveling, whether by land or sky. Jet lag has struck me hard and my situational awareness has been shaken as a result. After arriving at the home of my host family, my body collapsed into the state known as napping as a result of exhaustion.

Upon awakening, from my disorientating slumber, I was treated to a surprisingly strenuous trip to the Supermarket. Food was bought and delivered. Sleep almost claimed me once again but I fought against its will with victorious results. Several times within this venture of a day, my appetite was tested. Pretzels are surprisingly hard to eat. A beautifully quaint and rustic establishment in Pfaffenweiler was enough to defeat the stubborn will of my stomach however. Food and sleep are vital to higher human function as I have come to learn. I look forward to the sweet release of sleep once more and the energy that comes with a re-exhilarated body and mind.

May 28 – Emily

We left to go to school at 6:50 and rode the bus to school. When we got to school I was introduced to Soraya's friends and the Italian exchange student. Then classes started and we want to Social studies. We had to bring Johanna along because her exchange student wasn't having the first two classes because the teacher wasn't there. We got to leave so we could get the scavenger hunt started.

We started by going to the visitor center and got a map and then went to a church where we had to count the pews and eventually found our way to the top of the castle with an amazing view



we had some time left over and we stopped at a bakery and had a snack after looking around at some shops we decided to head back to school to tally the points and my team won so we get to get ice cream tomorrow as a prize

A group of us decided to play lazar tag in Freiburg I was not very good. We got a little lost trying to find the tram and once we got on the tram we realized that it was the wrong tram entirely.

When we got home I saw a calico cat walk across the street and I decided I have to pet that cat, so I walk over to it and it was the most friendly cat ever once I started petting it, it started to purr. So then I decided to pick it up and it climbed on my back and started to rub its head on my head which was probably the greatest thing that had happened all day.

May 29 - Carter

Today was a very productive day! We did many different things in the town of Gutach. But first we had to go to school for the first period of the day. For my exchange partner the period was English. They didn't do much, they mostly filled out worksheets the whole time. I played ticTacToe with Avery the whole time.

After the period we meet outside of the school and went in different types of German cars. We even got to ride in a German Firetruck! The ride to Gutach was about a hour and a half.

When we got there we went and ate a brunch with the mayor. He didn't speak much English so Mr. Halvorson translated what he said. After that we went to the Hofengel museumrestaurant. Here we learned about how old farmhouses worked about 400-500 years ago. After that we ate lunch at the restaurant that was part of the museum, which was amazing. Then went to the gift shop and looked at all the animals that lived on the farmhouse.

Then we went to a walking trail, but it wasn't just a regular walking trail, you walked it barefoot and stimulated your senses. We walked on (smooth) rocks, mulch, mud, grass, and dirt. Along the way there were little building that you could guess what a smell is through a tube, feel something in a box and guess what it is, and a dark house that you had to navigate your way through by feeling your way around.

The very last thing we did in Gutach was ride this rollercoaster type thing. It is called sommerrodelbahn. We got to ride it at least 2 times some of us three. It's like a roller coaster where it pulls you up the hill by a chain, then you roll down the hill very quickly. You can control the speed you go with a brake. Plus there is a camera near the bottom too.

That is the interesting part of the day. After that I went home and ate pizza for dinner and relaxed for the rest of the day after that.

May 30 - Jace

Today was a fantastic day, we did so much and it was very exciting. First We went to church in the morning. It was a very nice service and was very cool hearing the eulogy in German for the first time. I very much encourage others to go to mass and see how different it is. Then after this, we went home and napped. I recommend a nap a day.

I could live without it. Anyways, waking and talking to all the other exchange students, in English, felt so good. It was nice speaking the same language as someone for once. So on the walk it was very amusing to see drunk people dancing and and singing. They did play their music very loudly and did not miss a beat on getting in the way of the bikers. The wine festival is 14 km and so seeing all kinds of people speaking German in one place is cool. I do advocate for the wine festival because this is a once in a lifetime experience.

After the wine festival we went home and relaxed there for a bit. We played ping pong for awhile until it was time to eat. We went to this nice restaurant where I ate

Today I feel my jet lag is finally clearing up. I slept until 10:30 and was refreshed and didn't find getting out of bed much of a burden. Jakob's father made toast, eggs with sausage, and baked beans for breakfast. And of course I drank apple juice mixed with sparkling water to wash the food down. By about noon, Simon, Jace, and Simon's mother had come to our house to pick us up. We then rode for about half an hour to Tunisee where we were going to wakeboard.

A lot of the other American student, with their exchange partners, were also at the lake. Malte seemed to be the expert of wake boarding and attempted to teach many of us how to do it. Unfortunately, there were still many failed attempts. Because of this, a good amount of us tried kneeboards instead of the wakeboards. For me, it didn't seem to matter which one I used, I was not able to get a good run. Jakob had some decent runs on the wakeboard, as well as on the knee board. In fact, he made it all around the circuit on the knee board. Despite a lot of our miserable attempts, I believe we all had a great amount of fun with the activity.

June 1 - Johanna

Today was a fun day! We went to Switzerland! I woke up at 9 am, and we had breakfast outside. Already, it was hot outside and I almost got sunburnt. After breakfast, I picked my backpack and then we were picked up by Yannick, Lauren, and Yannick's mom- Frau Marshall. After we were picked up, we picked up Amanda and Anna. We drove an hour (at one point on the autobahn) and got to Basel, Switzerland. After we parked in a parking garage, we went to Museum Tinguely. Inside the museum were weird creations that did weird things. Every fifteen minutes, the biggest creation would move.

There were a bunch of other cool things too. For example there was a briefcase that would go up and down and open and close, like it were flying. 

Tater Tot Breakfast Casserole

Prep: 15 Mins | Total: 1Hr 30 Mins Serves: 6-8 Difficulty: Easy Ingredients

¹⁄₄ Pound Fresh breakfast sausage, casings removed
² Cups Shredded cheddar cheese or cheese mix, divided
⁶ Eggs
¹ Cup Milk
¹⁄₂ teaspoon Onion powder
¹⁄₂ teaspoon Garlic powder
¹⁄₄ to taste
¹Ground Black Pepper, to taste
¹⁄₄ Pounds Frozen tater tots (20 ounces)
¹⁄₄ Pound Bacon, cooked and crumbled
² Tablespoons Chopped Fresh Parsley (*Optional*) (garnish)

Directions

Preheat the oven to 350°F/175°C.

Cook sausage in a large skillet over medium high heat, breaking up the meat while browning it. Drain the cooked sausage and layer it into the bottom of an 8 x 11-inch baking pan or casserole dish.

Sprinkle 1 cup of the shredded cheese over the cooked sausage.

In a large bowl, whisk together the eggs, milk, onion powder, garlic powder, black pepper, and salt. Pour the egg mixture over the cheese and sausage.

Layer the frozen tater tots over the egg mixture. At this point, you can either bake the casserole immediately, or cover it and keep it in the refrigerator overnight so it is ready to bake the next morning.

Bake for 50-60 minutes or until the eggs are just set. Remove the casserole from the oven and top it with the remaining shredded cheese and the cooked and crumbled bacon. Bake for another 5-10 minutes or until the cheese is melted.

Allow the casserole to cool for 5-10 minutes before serving. Garnish with chopped parsley.
