

YOU MAY NEED SOME HELP! The Dubois County Genealogical Society would like to help you!

Our mission statement is to collect, preserve, and share Genealogy information. We Are a 501c3 nonprofit organization. Organization started in 1992. We have 200 plus members. Membership fees are \$15/yr or \$18/yr/couple. Built a room in the Museum in 2020 Covid year. We have three computers connected to high-speed internet. Have over 1600 books and files of ancestral information on site. Family trees on computer consisting of over 851,000 names. Have published 26 books, cemeteries, births, marriage, deaths. Have The Herald (actual papers) back to April 1858.

We have an Advanced Family Search License---Additional 214 million records. Send out newsletters 4 time/yr. and have a Christmas party. Like us on Face book @Dubois County Genealogical Society. We are here to help you.

We can help with first time or advanced family tree research questions and with family tree program on your computer or internet. We can even help with loading your tree onto your smart phone

The 1950 census was released in April 2022.

Biographies and Autobiographies are like icing on a cake.

1st Interview the oldest people in your family tree and write their biography. (Prepare a list of questions before the interview to keep the conversation going; we have a suggested list here)

2nd Write your own autobiography.

3rd Interview the younger people in your family tree.

4th Use modern technology apps on your phone or computer to record conversations and even type out the conversation as you speak.

Use apps like, Google Docs, Microsoft Word, and many other apps and programs. We can help you with all of this

You can find birth certificates, grade school pictures. Registration card, army pictures, etc. The search never has to end.

We have produced books about local information on births, baptisms, marriages, deaths, cemetery indexes, and all are available for sale.

How can you join us in our mission?

Stop in and see us in the Dubois County Museum located in Jasper, IN. Open hours are Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday. (Same hours of operation as the museum)

Bring your problems and questions.

We would be honored to input you family tree in our records. (Adding to the current 851,139 names).


We can always use more members and volunteers to work. While visiting us, please enjoy the museum also! Visit the Library Genealogy Room also.

The only bad question is the one you don't ask. We can help you with proper sourcing of your records. Get a gravesite posted to Findagrave.com. We can now GPS a tombstone on Find-a-Grave.

Use a DNA kit and most of all "manage the results". We do not replace any genealogy in the library.

John Milton coined more English words than anyone else.

The English language is the result of thousands of years of collaboration and evolution. Although its Germanic roots provide core function words, English is filled with loanwords from more than 350 languages. Of course, the language has also been blessed by many writers and poets whose inventive vocabularies fill our dictionaries and no one is as etymologically prolific as the English poet John Milton. His most famous work, "Paradise Lost" (an epic poem retelling the biblical allegory of Adam and Eve), is considered to be one of the finest pieces of English literature, but Milton has another claim to fame as the writer who coined the most English words. During his 65 years on Earth, Milton created 630 new words and phrases, including "debauchery," "fragrance," and "pandemonium" (the latter from the name of Hell's capital city in "Paradise Lost").

Although Milton leads the pack, he does have some stiff competition. For example, William Shakespeare has slightly fewer than 500 word coinages to his name, by some counts. Meanwhile, the English polymath and author Thomas Browne is credited with 771 "first use" words (such as "carnivorous," "hallucination," and "ferocious") by the Oxford English Dictionary, although that doesn't necessarily mean he invented them. Most scholars believe Browne and Shakespeare's "new word" contributions are much lower than Milton's, although the history of language is tricky - it's extremely difficult to know if a writer created a new word from scratch or was simply the first to use an already existing word. Other writers who've made sizable contributions include Geoffrey Chaucer, John Donne, and Ben Jonson. (taken from www.interestingfacts.com)

Impossibly Easy Cheeseburger Pie

Ingredients

- 1 lb lean (at least 80%) ground beef
- 1 large onion, chopped (1 cup)
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese (4 oz)
- 1/2 cup Original Bisquick™ mix
- 1 cup milk
- 2 eggs

Steps

- 1 Heat oven to 400°F. Spray 9-inch glass pie plate with cooking spray.
- 2. In 10-inch skillet, cook beef and onion over medium heat 8 to 10 minutes, stirring occasionally, until beef is brown; drain. Stir in salt. Spread in pie plate. Sprinkle with cheese.
- 3. In small bowl, stir remaining ingredients with fork or wire whisk until blended. Pour into pie plate.




