Pfaffenweiler's mayor stops in to celebrate continued partnership with Jasper

Pfaffenweiler Mayor Lukas Mahler and his assistant Diana Treyer made a special visit to Jasper last week.

This is Mahler's first visit to Jasper. The 25-year-old was elected into office last September and began serving as mayor of the 2,500 residents of the German town in November. According to the mayor, 25 years old is the minimum age to be elected to office in Germany. He previously served as Pfaffenweiler's clerk-treasurer, an appointed position. He has a degree in municipal

management and will serve as mayor for an eight-year term.

Treyer, whose maiden name is Eckerle, has visited Jasper several times and has family in the area.

During the event, Mayor Mahler said he felt the impact of the connection the Partnership has created in his short time in Jasper. "We are so warmly welcomed. It's like five minutes after you meet the people, it is like you talk to them every day," he said, adding that this is a shared feeling between the residents of both cities.

The pair arrived in time to celebrate the renewal of the partnership between the two cities and attend the special Wine and Dine Event held Saturday evening with the Wine Queen of Germany, Katrin Lang, and the Wine Queen of Baden, Jessica Himmelsbach.

During a press conference held Friday morning in the Pfaffenweiler Room at City Hall, Jasper Partnership Commission president Max Verkamp noted the celebration of the 37th anniversary was an extension of the 35th anniversary that was postponed due to the pandemic.

On December 31, 2022, the partnership commissions of Jasper and Pfaffenweiler signed the Unified Declaration for the future of the Partnership between Jasper and Pfaffenweiler. This declaration was the finalized output from discussions that started back in July when

Pfaffenweiler and Jasper celebrated the 37th Anniversary of the Partnership.

As part of the anniversary activities, the Pfaffenweiler Partnership Commission hosted members of the Jasper Partnership Commission, Sister Cities of Jasper, and the Jasper German Club in an engaging brainstorming session centered on how to continue strengthening the relationships between the two communities.



These watches bearing the logo of the Sister Cities Program were created to celebrate the 35th anniversary. A special clock featuring the same logo was gifted to Jasper recently.

As a follow-up to the July session and over the back half of 2022, the declaration, which created the road map for the future, was created and refined through discussions between all of the parties.

The declaration identified three guiding principles.

The first is the sustainability of personal contacts. The groups want to make the personal encounters and exchanges sustainable and find ways these short-term contacts can be turned into long-term relationships.

"I think Lukas and Diana being here today is evidence of that and demonstrates the importance of how we can continue to do that," Verkamp said.

The second is a common financial foundation.

"We are aware that the activities to strengthen the partnership will require a solid financial foundation and want to explore various possibilities to support the mission," Verkamp read from a prepared statement.

And the third principle is exchanges and encounters. The groups want to maintain personal contacts and student exchange and build upon them with additional exchange formats. These formats can be remarkably diverse just like the life of our communities.

"For example, the student exchange started in 1986. So one year after the start of the partnership, I, fortunately, was one of the first five Jasper students that had the opportunity to go to Pfaffenweiler and really created a foundation from which I've been able to be engaged in this partnership," Verkamp said, adding that he's been able to provide that experience to his own children.

Whereas some cities announce their relationship with another city through the partnership program, Jasper and Pfaffenweiler have built a relationship over the years that includes the student exchange, annual trips and some shared projects. "When I was one of the first students to go over, that was just the beginning of the roots of the program," Verkamp noted after the announcement on Friday. "Now the roots have grown and we have become this larger tree with very deep roots between our two communities."

Mary Leah Siegel, President of Sister Cities of Jasper, is a first-generation U.S. citizen on her father's side. She has close connections to family in Germany. Speaking of the importance of reestablishing those connections between the two communities over 37 years, she noted how important they were for the future.

I don't personally want to lose that for my family, and I want for everyone to be able to know where they came from," she said. "And, even if they're not from Germany, (I want them) to have that relationship with the sister cities and the experience."

The cultural connections are written in stone. While she was on a trip to Pfaffenweiler last summer, Siegel was touring a church there and noticed marks on the stones of the church. "Certain stone carvers make marks on stones just in the way they carved," she said. "And those same marks are in St. Joseph Church."

Shared thumbprints with an ocean between the two that connect both communities.

This signed declaration shows that both Jasper and Pfaffenweiler are truly committed to the partnership and have the desire to see it continue.

Wine and Dine Your Valentine with friends from Germany By Kathy Tretter – Editor (reprinted from the Ferdinand News – February 15, 2023)

A surprise was in store over the weekend for Jasper and the Dubois County community when not only two German wine queens crossed the Atlantic to visit Jasper, but Pfaffenweiler Bürgermeister Lukas Mahler and his administrative assistant Diana Treyer made the journey as well.

Sister Cities of Jasper hosted a wine and Dine Your Valentine event Saturday evening at Klubhaus61, providing the perfect opportunity to meet all four and to sample exquisite wines from the Baden (Badishe) region of Germany (and delicious food from the restaurant).

Bürgermeister Mahler is 25-years-old – the second youngest Bürgermeister or mayor in Germany.

While he grew up in Freiburg, his family historically hails from Pfaffenweiler.

He graduated in 2019 with a B.A. in Public Management from the University of Public Administration in Kehl, where he still teaches part time.

After college Mahler began his career in the tax and finance department as city treasurer for Pfaffenweiler and when former Bürgermeister Dieter Hahn decided to retired, Lukas decided to throw his hat into the ring.

City and town elections in Germany are non-political, so political affiliation has no bearing on the results. Mahler won over 60 percent of the vote over his two opponents but all three get along well and there was no negativity in any of the campaigns.

Jasper's Sister City is smaller by population at around 2,600 residents, but Mahler explained it is also much smaller geographically.

"We are very limited (for growth)," he noted. "There are vineyards on every side so the shortage of space makes expansion difficult."

The drive from the airport to Jasper included a trip through Ferdinand and Mahler said he immediately noticed houses are larger here, surrounded by much more green space.

Germany has the most complicated tax system in the world, making having a financial expert at the helm rather provident. Mahler's current conundrum is expanding the existing kindergarten building to accommodate Pfaffenweiler's growing population. He said that after a lull over several years Germany is experiencing a baby boom and families are expanding to the point the recently built school building is no longer large sufficient.

Schools in Germany are funded by the state when it comes to salaries, but the communities themselves are responsible for the buildings.

There are, of course, many other differences but also many similarities between sister cities. In Germany, there are no city or town police departments – every community relies on the state.

Like communities in Indiana, Pfaffenweiler depends on its volunteer fire department.

The war in Ukraine is definitely having a more detrimental affect in Germany than here, as the price of energy has risen exponentially, creating problems for businesses and residents alike. In addition, when China shut down due to COVID-19 it created massive shortages in groceries and other materials. "The trend of deglobalization has been detrimental with COVID," Lukas said, which is similar to the effect here in the U.S.

He noted that worker shortages span the globe – "We are economically globalized and we can't draw the line."

Pfaffenweiler is located in what is known as Snail Valley and much like Jasper's Strassenfest, the community plays host annually to the Schnecke-Fescht or Snail Festival. The snails originally filled the valley's vineyards and Treyer explained they would languish on the terraced rocks. Much like Strassenfest, the city's non-profits gather to plan the annual festival and all share in the

proceeds. Unlike Strassenfest the food highlights include things like snail soup and snails sautéed in garlic butter.

Duties for both the Bürgermeister and his administrative assistant, along with one other city employee, include conducting weddings as in Germany and most of Europe a civil ceremony is essential while the church service is optional.

At about this point the two wine queens (Weinkönigin) enter.

Katrin Lang is Germany's Deutsche Weinkönigin – chosen from the 13 women elected within their districts.

Whereas much of America thinks beer as the most German of beverages, the German wine industry is massive. Katrin is the 74th wine queen in Germany's history but unlike queen competitions in this country, she and fellow contestants all work in the wine industry and she explained beer is more closely associated with the northern part of the country.

With Katrin is Jessica Himmelsbach, the Badishe Weinkönigin. The two are friends who studied wine making together at the University in Freiburg. Jessica is the Baden district's 72nd wine queen.

They are both ambassadors for the German wine industry and brought with them a selection of pinot noirs, pinot blancs and burgundy wines.

Katrin explained she has worked as a seller, put the grapes in a press and has literally been involved in all steps of wine making which, by the way, stretches back over 5,000 years.

Early on, according to Jessica, more families grew grapes and made wine for personal consumption.

Katrin's grandmother worked in the vineyards but Jessica opted for this career because she wanted to do something hands-on.

Both drew several parallels from their home to Jasper noting both communities are interest in tradition, are a distance from larger metropolitan areas and both boast a rural agricultural economy. Both also noted the geographic differences. "We are much more compact," explained Jessica, "and don't have this much space."

As the interview drew to a close, Diana Treyer noted, "The people of Pfaffenweiler and Jasper, we are friends. We are all (in each other's) hearts."

Jasper resident Patti Goepfrich added, "They are all our families."

Next, Laura Grammer introduced the Wine Queens who came up and gave a presentation on their duties of being a wine queen and what criteria they had to meet to compete. They also did a wine tasting with wines from Pfaffenweiler. Landen then presented them with bottles of wine from the Vine to Wine event that the German Club members made and led the club in an Ein Prosit for the Wine Queens.

Laura Grammer announced the Bread Contest winners from the bread that was brought in by German Club members. The contest was judged by the Strassenfest Committee and categories judged were glazed, apple strudel and other.

The Jasper DeutscherVerein is offering a scholarship in the amount of \$1,000 to a German student of Dubois County. If you have a child, grandchild or know of anyone who would like to submit an application, please inform them to contact their Guidance Counselor at their school. Applications must be postmarked no later than April 1, 2023. If any questions, please contact Shelley Whalen at 812-827-1027.

At their January Board of Directors' Meeting in 2008, the following adopted the following qualifications for the Dubois County Scholarship in the amount of \$1,000.00.

- 1. Completion of the common scholarship application available from the School's Guidance Office.
- Successful completion of two years of high school German.
- 3. Two years of active participation in German Club or German Civic affairs in other schools.
- 4. Verification of enrollment in a German course at the college of their choice, or participation in an accredited German study abroad program such as the IU Honors Program.
- 5. Submission of a one page or less essay stating your personal qualifications and intentions.
- GPA consideration.
- 7. Participation in an exchange program or hosting an exchange student.
- 8. Submission of two letters of recommendation from adults <u>other than</u> school personnel regarding personal character, etc.
- 9. The scholarship will be awarded upon verification of enrollment in German at college or acceptance into another German study abroad program such as the IU Honors Program. A \$500.00 scholarship will be given for the first semester and will be renewable for the second semester.
- 10. Parental membership in the Jasper Deutscher Verein will be considered.

Our genealogy society is trying to "collect, preserve, and share our genealogy history". We, in turn, help people work on and expand their family tree, whether they are a first time beginner, or have been researching for many years. We use many programs to assist in research, such as FamilySearch.com, Ancestry.com, MyHeritage.com, findagrave.com, billionsgraves.com, and many others. Our strong point is that we have experienced people that can help you with your research.

In our room at the Dubois County Museum in Jasper, we have three computers linked to the internet, over 1600 books and files on ancestral information, a computer program with over 851,000 names in family trees, and our society has published 26 books on cemeteries, births, baptisms, marriages, and deaths.

The most popular computer family tree programs are Legacy and Family Tree Marker. We can help you install and work with all of these.

I recently visited the Family Search Center in Salt Lake City, Utah. This is a genealogy researcher's paradise.

We try to help people with a broad range of things. We can help you with transferring pictures from your cell phone, how to have a recorded conversation typed for you automatically, DNA research, and of course, genealogy research.
